#### February Speaker:

#### Our Own Bill Hale

Our February speaker will be our very own plant doctor, Bill Hale. As part of his talk, Bill will give a potting demonstration on Cattleya orchids, which are his favorites. If there is still a member left who has not ooh' ed and ahh' ed over Bill' s lush and colorful Cattleyas, they are a sight to behold. Following the potting demonstration,

Bill will present a slide program.

Bill and Ida Hale have been growing orchids for 40 years. Bill actually got his first orchid from Ida. He read in the newspaper that a nursery in Reedley

California was going out of business. The couple had never seen an orchid so, intrigued, they went to see what one looked like. The facility they visited was a large greenhouse with hundreds of cattleya orchids which were not then in bloom.

Well you guessed it! Ida bought Bill an orchid plant, and a love affair was born. By this time, you know you just can't stop at just one of these addictive plants. Bill joined the Fresno Orchid Society, then with Ida, built a small 9'x 9' greenhouse in Hanford, California. When they moved to Monterey the greenhouse came with them.

Bill joined the Carmel Orchid Society in 1968. He has been has been very active in the society, serving as President, Vice President, Librarian, Director and Plant Doctor and now holds the more or less honorary post of Past President. He skipped a year or two between some of

those duties, but has been an integral part of the Society for well over thirty years, now.

In November 1984, when the Hales had a chance to rent a 25' x 40' greenhouse in Carmel Valley, they needed to find a way to cover the extra expenses for the greenhouse and supplies, so they

teamed up with Jim Nybakken, our current President, and started a business now known as Bakkehelle Orchids.

As Bill frequently admonishes his audiences: If you want to grow and bloom your orchids, you' ve got to give them good water, bright light, warm, not hot temperatures, fertilizer and lots of love.

For those of us who know Bill, he is love itself. Come and hear Bill talk about his beautiful beloved Cattleyas!

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

## Cattleya Culture

Cattleyas are among the most commonly grown orchids, and their culture is often used as the basis for comparison with other types of orchids.

The flowers in cattleyas and their related hybrids come in many colors. Culture varies only slightly among most of these groups; this cultural information is a general guide to "standard" cattleya culture.

Like most other cultivated orchids, cattleyas are epiphytes, or air-plants. Because they are epiphytic, they have developed water-storage organs, called pseudobulbs, and have large, fleshy roots covered with a spongy, water-retentive velamen. They are accustomed to being dry at the roots between waterings, and therefore should be potted in a very porous, free-draining medium.

**LIGHT** is one of the most important factors in growing and blooming cattleyas, whether in a greenhouse setting or in the

home. Bright light to some sun must be given to the plants, but no direct sun in the middle of the day. This means at east, shaded- south (as with a sheer curtain) or west window in the home, and 30% to 50% of full sun in a greenhouse (3,000 to 5,000 footcandles). Leaves should be a medium green color.

**TEMPERATURES**. Recommended temperatures are 55 to 60 degrees F at night and 70 to 85 degrees during the day. Seedlings should have night temperatures 5 to 10 degrees higher. A 10 to 20 degrees differential be-

tween day and night is recommended, especially for mature plants. Higher day temperatures can be tolerated (up to 95 degrees F), if humidity, air circulation and shading are increased.

WATER should be provided in two ways: in the pot by watering and in the air as humidity. Watering in the pot is dictated by many criteria - size and type of pot, temperature, light, etc. Mature cattleyas need to dry out thoroughly before being watered again. Seedlings need slightly more constant moisture. Compare the weight of a dry pot of the same size and type of medium; it can indicate if a plant needs water. A freshly sharpened pencil inserted in the potting medium can be an indicator of moisture. If in doubt, it's best to wait a day or two until watering. Plants in active growth need more water than plants that are resting. Water below 50 degrees F may injure plants, as will softened water.

**HUMIDITY**. Cattleyas need 50% to 80% relative humidity. This can be provided in the home by placing the plants on trays of gravel, partially filled with water so that the plants stand above the water. Misting the plants in the morning only

is helpful in dry climates. Air should always be moving around the plants to prevent fungal or bacterial disease, especially if high humidity and/or cool temperatures exist. In the greenhouse the humidity can be increased by wetting the floor. Evaporative cooling increases humidity while cooling the air.

**FERTILIZER** must be given to cattleyas on a regular schedule. In fir bark, a high nitrogen (30-10-10) formulation, or a similar proportion, is used. High-phosphorus or bloom booster (10-30-20) formulation may be used occasionally (every 4 to 6 applications) to make sturdy growths and promote healthy blooming. When in active growth, plants need fertilizer every two weeks, and when not growing, once a month. Fertilizer can also be applied with every watering at 1/4 recommended dilution. Thorough flushing with clear water every month is recommended to prevent buildup of fertilizer salts.



**POTTING** is necessary when 1) the rhizome of the plants protrudes over the edge of the pot, or 2) the potting medium starts to break down and drain poorly (usually after 2 to 3 years). It is best to repot 1) just before new roots sprout from the rhizome, 2) after flowering, or 3) in the spring time.

Mature cattleyas are usually potted in medium-grade potting material; seedlings in fine-grade. Until a plant has six mature pseudobulbs, it generally should be put into a larger pot

and not divided. If dividing a plant, 3 to 5 bulbs per division are required. Select a pot that will allow for 2 to 3 years of growth before crowding the pot. Place a small cone of potting material in the bottom of the pot, cut off any rotten roots, and spread the firm, live roots over the cone. Fill the pot with medium, working it around the roots. Pack firmly; stake if necessary. Keep the plant humid, shaded and dry at the roots for a while to promote new root growth. A vitamin B1 solution may help reestablish plants quickly.



#### Helpful Hints from Bill Hale


Oh, the pearls of orchid-growing wisdom that drop like rain whenever one "hangs around" Bill Hale. We probably learn more from an evening of standing *near* him than a year of orchid classes could teach us. Here's one:

The proper watering schedule for orchids has a lot to do with how fast the pots will dry out. A good rule of thumb to follow is: 1" pots, water daily. 2" pots, every other day. 3" pots, every third day, and so on up. Larger pots and coarser bark tend to hold onto moisture longer.

Now, this rule will have to be amended depending on humidity and potting material, but there's a good place to start, don't you think?
