February Speaker Ivan Portilla

Ecuagenera was launched 50 to participate in the business. years ago with the arrival of the Catholic priest, Father Angel Andreetta, in the Bomboiza sector in the village of Gualaquiza (Wal-la-kee'

sah), in the eastern province of Morona Santiago. In Bomboiza, a place privileged for its abundance of gold deposits and flora orchidacea, Andreetta began the process of researching, selecting and collecting orchid species, making him a pioneer of orchid collection in the region, the Dracula at right is named for him. As a result of his work, in 1968 it was possible for Ecuador to partici-

sition of orchids in Colombia.

Wanting his work to continue, Andreetta found help from a young man who demonstrated a real love for nature: Mario Portilla, who would become his main ally for many years. Later, Andreetta continued his work of orchid collection in the hacienda Yumacay in Paute.

Meanwhile, they felt the need to build a business that would be dedicated to the conservation and marketing of orchids. In 1991 José Portilla, Mario's younger brother, appeared on the scene. Jose demonstrated a deep interest in this work and was invited

February 1992 marked the beginning of the new business, which by May of the same year was legally recognized under the name Géneros Ec-

> uatorianos Ecuagenera CIA, TDA. The Portilla brothers were the founding members and Andreetta was their adviser. It was this organization which took charge of the preservation of Andreetta's orchid collection. To this day, this collection is carefully preserved in an effort to support the maintenance and reproduction of various species.

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Masdevallia & Dracula Culture

Species usually from cool, misty mountains of the New World Tropics. Masdevallias are best known for their showy flowers consisting of sepals fused into a tube like structure. Their origins in cool, damp environments make them an excellent choice for cool or coastal climates. Most species and hybrids are compact enough so that they can

be easily accommodated on windowsills or under lights.

L I G H T should be like that given for phalaenopsis and paphiopedilums — 1,000 to 1,500 footcandles. Masdevallias can be kept in light intensities up to 2,500 footcandles if the growing area can be kept cool. Plants grow well under standard fluorescent fixtures and can be summered outside in shade. In the home, place in an east or shaded south window or under artificial lights.

TEMPERATURES should be cool to intermediate. The plants will grow slowly and eventually expire if temperatures remain high for long periods. Cool evenings help reduce heat stress during the day. Nights of 55 to 60 F are ideal; day temperatures should be 65 to 75 F. Evaporative cooling pads or humidifiers are useful in maintaining these conditions. Avoid day temperatures higher than 80 F.

WATER is critical for these plants because they have minimal water-storage tissue. Roots should be allowed to become almost dry before watering again; if drainage is adequate, constantly moist roots are fine. Good-quality water low in dissolved solids is imperative for success.

H U M I D I T Y is an important factor in the successful culture of masdevallias. The ideal range is 60 to 80 percent. In the home, set the plants on trays of gravel partially filled with wa-

ter. In the greenhouse or enclosed growing area, humidity can be increased by use of a humidifier, while evaporative coolers help raise humidity and lower temperatures. If plants are summered outdoors, automatic misters under the benches are recommended as is more frequent soaking.

F E RT I L I Z E regularly with a dilute solution while plants are actively growing. Applications of

30-10-10-type formulations twice a month are ideal for plants in a bark-based medium. A 20-20-20-type formulation should be used for plants in other media. If weather is overcast, applications once a month are sufficient.

POTTING is best done in the winter or early spring, before the heat of summer arrives or as new roots are produced. Plants must be repotted frequently, every one to two years, before the potting mix decomposes. A fine-grade potting medium, such as fine fir bark or tree-fern fiber, is often used with plastic pots. Sphagnum moss is also used, especially for establishing plants. The plant should be positioned in the pot so that the newest growth is farthest from the edge of the container, allowing the maximum number of new growths without crowding the vessel. Plants growing in many directions may be positioned in the center of the pot. Spread the roots over a cone

of potting medium and fill in around the roots with potting medium to the junction of the roots and the plant. Firm the medium around the roots. Keep humidity high and the potting medium slightly dry until new roots form.



Orchid Growing Tips

As I sit down to write this column today, the day is beautiful and the greenhouse feels warm with the smells of lush greenery. What a welcome change from all the cold weather! I have pulled off many yellow and brown spotted leaves from my plants. Good hygiene is important to inhibit the spread of

bacteria and fungi. There are some good orchid growers now using regular household hydrogen peroxide to control such bacteria. Put some in a little spray bottle and spray it on those brown spots that detract from our orchid's appearance. You can also use a little bit of Neosporin on the cut edges of leaves that you trim. Pat Landee has found a good

orchid encyclopedia online. It is called the Orchid Lady's Illustrated Orchid Encyclopedia www.orchidlady.com/encyclopedia/. Many of the genera described are accompanied by photos as well. I have found that many orchid societies like ours have put their newsletters online. They make for interesting reading and can be very informative about upcoming events in their respective areas.
