October Speaker Scott Collins

Scott Collins is the owner of Echo Valley Orchids, in Salinas Ca. The nursery has been growing, showing and breeding Phalaenopsis, Miniature Cattleyas and many other genera for 20 years. Over the years they have received over 80 AOS flower quality and cultural awards for their plants. Many of Scott's hybrids have also received recognition by the American Orchid Society, as well.

Scott is an accredited orchid judge of the American Orchid Society and has held the position of Vice Chairman of the Pacific Central Judging Region.

Our October program covers "Understanding What Makes an Award Quality Orchid", as seen through the eyes of an orchid breeder and AOS judge. Scott will look at and discuss the various attributes that make award quality orchid flowers. We will also look at what it takes to become an AOS judge and the American Orchid Society flower quality awards.

Scott has had the great opportunity to speak about Phalaenopsis and other orchid subjects to a very wide audience including programs at all the local northern California societies, British Columbia, The International Phalaenpsis Alliance meetings in New York and Los Angeles, as well as the World Orchid Conference in Vancouver, B.C.

AOS Awards

Editors Note: Since our program this month deals with awards I thought that a general review of AOS awards, might help set the stage for Scott's presentation. Several of the pictures in this issue are award winners from Mayfaire 2005 and this should help explain the codes.

The American Orchid Society grants awards to encourage and recognize meritorious achievement in all fields of orchid endeavors in accordance with the established rules set out in the *Handbook on Judging and Exhibition*. There are awards for flower quality, excellence of culture, advancements in hybridizing, botanical interest and other recognition-worthy aspects. There are also prestigious specialty awards granted annually for exceptional plants singled out as the best of the best from each year's awards.

AD (Award of Distinction) and AQ (Award of Quality) These awards for breeding recognize worthy new trends and improved quality, respectively.

AM (Award of Merit) A flower scoring 80 to 89 points on a 100-point scale. This flower-quality award is a fine though lesser achievement than the FCC.

CBR (Certificate of Botanical Recognition) Awarded to rare and unusual species with educational interest. This award is granted provisionally and filed with the judging center Chair pending the exhibitor's supplying full taxonomic verification by a taxonomist acceptable to the AOS. The AOS Web-site provides information regarding AOS-approved taxonomists, which also includes instructions on obtaining taxonomic verification.

CCM (Certificate of Cultural Merit)
The beginning orchid grower may hope to attain this award because it recognizes the grower, rather than flower quality. The CCM/AOS may be given more than once if

the plant continues to thrive and increase in both the size and number of flowers.

CCE (Certificate of Cultural Excellence) This award further distinguishes growers of plants that exhibit an extreme degree of skill in cultivation, having received 90 point or more on the scale that has been used for the Certificate of Cultural Merit (CCM).

CHM (Certificate of Horticultural Merit) Awarded to a well-grown and well-flowered species or natural hybrid with characteristics that contribute to the horticultural aspects of orchidology, such as aesthetic appeal. This award is granted provisionally and filed with the judging center Chair pending the exhibitor's supplying full taxonomic verification by a taxonomist acceptable to the AOS. The AOS Web-site provides information regarding AOS-approved taxonomists, which also includes instructions on obtaining taxonomic verification.

FCC (First Class Certificate) The highest flower-quality award, given to flowers scoring 90 points or more on a 100-point scale.

HCC (Highly Commended Certificate)

The HCC is granted to a flower scoring 75 to 79 points on a 100-point scale. The great majority of awarded orchids receive this award, which implies that, while the flower is outstanding, there is room for improvement.

JC (Judges' Commendation) Given for distinctive characteristics that the judges unanimously feel should be recognized but cannot be scored in the customary ways.

Orchid Growing Tips

I thought I would share some orchid buying tips for you this month. Tropical Orchid Farm in Maui, Hawaii is having their fall sale. You can email them off their website to request their sales catalog. I got mine in just a few days and they have great prices and some unusual orchids. Their phone is 866-572-8569. Their website is www.tropicalorchidfarm.com.

Another good sale is from J & L Orchids in Connecticut. They have an online catalog and sales flyer at 20% savings. Their website is www.jlorchids.com. Both of these orchid companies are very well respected and you may trust their plants. They carry orchids you will not find in the grocery store!

I've located another informative orchid website both for photos and cultural information from Merkles Orchids. Their website address is www.merklesorchids.com.

If you live on the peninsula, you may wonder when summer is coming, but the plants and trees are telling us that fall is in the air. If we have a cool Sept and Oct, you will want to cut down or eliminate the nitrogen in your fertilizer for your cymbidiums. Time to switch to a bloom booster fertilizer like 0-10-10. If we get a long heat wave, you can try and get some more growth out of them before spiking begins. Check the cyms now though. I have 2 or 3 showing spikes already.

Our nighttime temperatures will start to cool off now too as we have lost 2 hrs of daylight. For those of you with greenhouses, don't turn on the heat too soon. Those cool nights may stress out your plants a little bit. That can be a good thing as it will trigger some plants to put up spikes, especially the phalenopsis orchids. Right now my peninsula greenhouse is going down to 54 degrees at night. At about 48 de-

grees, I will have to turn the heat on. There will be some sticker shock if you use a natural gas heater this winter. Natural gas prices are already up 140% over this time last year. Katrina has crippled production, so they are predicted to go higher this winter. Fortunately there are many cool growing orchids like cymbidiums that can stay outside and take the cold. There are some successful orchid growers in our society who have unheated greenhouses year round.

So it can be done without supplemental heat if necessary. Hope you all had a great time at the greenhouse tour. This hobby is that much more fun when you get to share it with each other.
