From my perspective it was a good show: lots of beautiful orchids, good vendors with interesting plants, good food, lots of people looking at and asking questions about the orchids on display, I sold most of the plants I put up sale, and the one glitch (Sunday morning rain) didn't turn into a real disaster.

Orchids, growing and blooming. Most of my orchids are either in bloom or are growing, there are of course the problem children, but I still find it amazing that I always have something in bloom. This started around the time that the collection passed the 200 mark and hasn't stopped.

About as different as two orchids can be. On the left is Holcoglossum flavescens the whole plant is only a couple of inches across. On the right a hybrid Cymbidium from the CVGS. The Cymbidiums flower is larger than the Holcoglossum plant.

Orchid Talk

As I enter my greenhouse, I am greeted with the sweet smell of coconut. My maxillaria tenufolia is in bloom. I also have a cross of max tenufolia and sanguinea blooming. It looks just like tenufolia, but I can detect a hint of chocolate in with the coconut fragrance! I caught diplocaulobium aratriferum in bloom. These white, star shaped flowers last one day and as they wilt, they change to bright pink. Aerangis citrata is in full bloom with it's pale yellow flowers, and as I approach the rear of my greenhouse, I am overwhelmed by the scent of Gongora rufescens in full bloom. It's brown and white flowers remind me a little of flying cranes. I round the corner to see that my

Pleurothasllis cyanea is in full bloom as well. This rare plant has tan and maroon flowers that hang like grapes from the apex of it's large leaves. I haven't even mentioned all the masdevallias in bloom. The coccineas are in full color ranging from white, yellow, pinks to red on tall spikes. The bright oranges like wellishii and veitchiana and Heathii are blooming along with Ruby Slippers with it's deep scarlet color. I know many members are enjoying the rewards of our year round labors. Show 'N Tell should be stunning at our June meeting.

There are still a few unwanted guests in my greenhouse as well. I have had more aphids than usual this year. They seem to go after the new growths and buds. I keep a spray bottle of rubbing



alcohol handy to squirt on them. It never seems to hurt the buds, but kills the aphids instantly. There are a few well fed mealy bugs hiding in the deep crevises of new growths or buds. You can pick them off or the alcohol works on them too. I will find that nasty, white boisoval scale on the underside of my cattleya leaves, usually in the remotest parts of my greenhouse. I will see a leaf with yellowing spots and I know to look underneath for the culprits. I remove what I see by hand using the alcohol again, but I do get out the Bayer 3 in 1 systemic to spray the plant thoroughly. If you have a plant with a large infestation, toss it out unless it is something very special. You don't want that scale to gain a real foothold in your collection. It is the time to be weeding you potting mix.

invisible. The orchids are easy to water and keep evenly moist. What I like best is I don't have to worry about repotting them in a year. I am seeing new growths on my unhappy draculas, so I am hopeful. I mounted some bulbophyllums and laelia anceps this past month hoping I can get them to bloom. I look for natural mounts like tree branches or old tree roots that can be found along the Carmel River. I have also used the usual cork, but sometimes I turn it around and use the backside that is smoother and curves to hug the orchid. I make my own hooks after I drill holes near the top. I found very bendable bailing wire in a large spool at Home Depot for \$3.73.

I am always looking for the perfect fertilizer. My goal is to eventually go completely organic and achieve great

results at the same time. I often add seaweed extract to whatever I am using. I remember Bruce Davidson recommended it as it adds alot of those

Last month I told you it was time to repot your cymbidiums. Well, I haven't repotted mine yet either. But it is time now for sure so make that chore as priority.

I have spent time mounting many of my orchids. Beverlys Craft Store out on Fremont carries bags of the Green Moss that our speaker, Bruce Davidson recommended. I also found large spools of fishing line at the Big 5 store for \$3.00. It works great and is nearly
