June Speaker: Bruce Rogers

About Sobralias

According to Bruce, he will give a rare public talk on the genus Sobralia, although those of us who have ever talked to Bruce know well that he will talk at length to anyone about Sobralias, one of his favorite orchid genera!.

Bruce has always had a passion for the plant kingdom, growing plants as a hobbyist from an early age. He began working professionally with orchids in the late seventies when he was hired by the City of Atlanta, GA Parks Department working in Piedmont Park's orchid greenhouses. Returning to San Francisco after this very successful endeavor, he was promptly hired by the Rod McLellan Company with two functions: head grower for their boarding department, and to work on Vanda hybridization. At that time, Rod McLellan was major force in the orchid world and the association with this company led to many great opportunities. In the early eighties Bruce left to start Bruce Rogers Orchids, a orchid consulting and



management company, and a few years later, Rogers-Fishman Boarding, A orchid boarding company in San Francisco. In the commercial world, he has consulted and worked with major companies, department stores, and civic groups both nationally and internationally. In the private sector he has had the opportunity to work with many interesting and influential people. He has designed and created Orchid Gardens in private homes from Marin to Santa Barbara.

Everybody Needs Somebody

Even the most zealous orchid addict sometimes needs a bit of a break, or a slight change of pace, all orchids all the time gets a little bit old. So here are some terrific companion plants for your orchid growing spaces, something to diversify your collection a bit.

Tillandsias are my number one choice for keeping your orchids company. Weird shapes, easy orchid friendly culture, fairly inexpensive, and easy growers. Tillandsias are sometimes called air plants, and they seem to do fine just hanging up in the air above your orchids without any mount, just a wire to suspend them, some develop some roots, but they are only used for support so mounts are completely optional. I give mine the same light as my high light plants (Cattleyas and Laelias) and wanter them when I water the rest of my mounted plants (around 5 times a week, less in the winter).

Drosera capensis, the cape sundew. This is a plant for the over-waterer in all of us. Keep it wet and bright and it will devour tons of those little fungus gnats that are always flying around. They easily reseed so you may find yourself pulling volunteers out of other wet growing plants in the vicinity.

Butterworts, Pinguicula sp., are another great wet growing carnivore with nice flowers.

Sarracenia (American pitcher plants) is another group of bog plants that can eat it's weight in insects. These are best outside all year round. They do best in full sun sitting in a pan of water. For most species, cut the pitchers off at the end of the winter as new pitchers will grow in the spring. Unlike orchids these plants do not like to be crowded in their pot which leades to a lot of dividing, repotting and sharing of divisions.

Less violent, but with much showier blooms than the carnivorous plants, the various epiphytic cacti of Epiphyllum, Disocactus, and several other geneses do very well in most orchid conditions. Some of these plants get quite large so pick wisely. Unlike the Tillandsias, where the plant is the main attraction, with the epiphytic cacti it is the blooms that are incredible. The blooms of Epiphyllum oxypetalum are 6 inches across and incredibly fragrant, unfortunately they open in late evening and done by early morning so set an alarm to see and smell these beauties.

If you are wondering what can go in that wasted space under the bench, try some ferns. They come big and small, most like the water and humidity that orchids like but most take lower light levels so the under bench area is perfect for them. Just watch out for volunteers, if a fern takes root in a pot with an orchid it can crowd the orchid



right out, so you need to be ruthless with removing any lovely fronds that emerge from your orchids pots.

And of course, what plant collection would be complete without some cacti and succulents. There are dozens to hundreds of weird plant forms many with cool flowers. Most will do alright with orchids but you need to watch the water as most are quite sensitive to over watering. So where can you find these companions? Tinder? Ashly Madison? Just kidding! We are looking for long term commitment not a one night stand (I have had enough of one month wonder plants. Beautiful and fascinating when you bring them home, compost a month later). Most of mine cam from vendors at larger orchid shows, other orchid growers, and specialty plant shows like the Monterey Bay Cacti and Succulent Society show in San Juan Batista. Like your orchid, you will need to look further than the nearest big box store or local nurserie for these babies, but the they are worth the search.
